Contra Costa College is one of the premier community colleges in the nation and it takes pride in the cleanliness and condition of its grounds and facilities. To ensure that the campus atmosphere remains conducive to effective teaching and learning, the following procedures should be followed.

1. It is also the responsibility of the instructor to educate students on in regards to the integrity of the classroom, and to monitor the classroom to ensure compliance with this policy. in which they teach.
2. Food or drink, outside of a sealable water container, are not allowed in classrooms, except by permission.
3. should not be brought in to a teaching classroom. If the instructor determines for the need to have food in the classroom, of seheduling necessity, permission must be granted by the area dean or immediate supervisor. If college funds are to be used, then permission must be granted by the college president pursuant to College Policy C3024.0.
4. community celebration or special circumstances determines that food is appropriate at this particular time and place. If permission is granted, then it is the instructor must that needs to take responsibility to make sure the classroom environment is cleaned for appropriately cleaning the classroom after any such event. of cireumstance.
5. To ensure proper disposal of food waste, trash must be placed in disposal containers and transported to the nearest refuse container outside of the classroom building.
6. Abuse of the classroom food and drink policy will result in admonishment and further action, if necessary, as deemed necessary by the area manager.

# DVC Proposal to Change Board GE Requirements

In Spring Semester of 2008 the faculty at DVC approved a major revision to the General Education Pattern required for our Associates degrees. In our new GE Pattern we have two options: a GE pattern for students completing an associates as a terminal degree from DVC, and a alternate GE Pattern for those students intending to transfer to a CSU or UC campus. For the Alternate pattern DVC uses the approved CSU General Education Pattern and the Intersegmental Transfer General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) requirements.

The DVC faculty also approved that as part of the revised GE, with the support of our sister colleges, we would pursue changing the District Board Requirements for a Ecology of Human Health course, American Institutions and two Physical Education Activity courses. Towards that goal, Laurie Lema (DVC Faculty Senate President), and myself attended your Faculty Senate Council meetings at CCC and LMC to learn how other senates run their meetings and to explain our new GE Patterns and the proposal to change the board requirements for PE and Ecology of Human Health.

Through the FSCC (Faculty Senate Coordinating Council), we would now like to ask that the faculty at our sister colleges consider endorsing these proposed changes to the Board Requirements. I know other colleges were considering online degrees that could also benefit from these changes. Please note that our DVC General Education pattern still retains the Ecology of Human Health, American Institutions and PE requirements, so adopting these proposed changes to Board Policy wound not require any college to change their GE patterns. It would allow an option for a change in these requirements at the college level if that college so desired.

After our discussion today - I wanted to clarify our goal of Board GE changes. I was suggesting removing the policy altogether as a simple, clear method to approve the DVC alternate GE plans which I copied on the email. I was thinking by giving more leeway in general to the colleges that would gain more support over all. But if that actually makes things too uncertain, DVC is just as happy only getting the Board to approve waiving the Health, PE and American Institutions requirements just for students using the IGETC and CSU GE patterns, and leaving it in place for the normal GE patterns. Or a even modified version of that if you are planning a similar GE - I think LMC had a version that allowed GE from any 4 year school- just as long as the IGETC and CSU GE could still fit.
